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"ENERGY PARTNER" SCHOLARSHIP AWARDED

The scholarship was created because of the overwhelming number of highly qualified students that submitted scholarship applications. The scholarship was awarded in a random drawing at the Co-op's annual business meeting in June.

The scholarship is funded directly by CEO/General Manager Bryan Case and his wife, Janice, who contributed the \$1,000 personally.

Building a Stronger Power Grid For Our Members

As we reported in our May/June *FLASHES* newsletter, Fall River Electric's power grid is one of the most reliable in the region! Last year the average number of minutes power was out per member was only 165 minutes out of 525,600 total operating minutes.

This year our crews are working even harder to reduce that outage number by installing several devices to help minimize power outages. One of the more significant reasons for outages is birds nesting or roosting on power poles and transformers. We are installing bird stands and guards

on a variety of the most popular spots for our avian friends.

In wintertime snow loading can also be a problem. This is when ice and/or wet snow sticks to power lines. When it falls off, it can cause the lines to slap together, leading to a power outage. Crews have been hard at work installing line spacers in areas where snow loading seems more likely. These investments will continue to pay dividends by reducing power outages, thus greatly improving reliability!

Helping Hands Wins Regional Service Award

The Paul J. Raver Community Service Award from the Northwest Public Power Association (NWPPA) was presented to Fall River Electric Cooperative for leadership in enhancing the role of achieving community betterment of a local area or region.

Fall River Electric Cooperative created Fall River Helping Hands as a separate 501(c)3 non-profit organization in 2010. The program collects donations from Fall River owner-members and then uses those donations to provide emergency energy assistance to other members who have an urgent need for help. Members receive assistance in several ways. Assistance can come in the form of a credit on their electric power bill; a credit on their propane bill; or direct payments to suppliers for firewood or other emergency heating needs. Over the last twelve years, Help-



ing Hands has distributed more than \$330,000 to 871 households.



What to do before you go:

- Check the weather;
- Be aware of water hazards and levels;
- Check your boat's operating condition; and
- Check fuel: One-third to go, one-third to return, and one-third in reserve.
- Be a responsible skipper!



Member Question Answered

At Fall River's annual business meeting held in June, owner-members were given the opportunity to submit written questions to the board. The board committed to providing all members with those questions and answers in upcoming issues of the *FLASHES* newsletter.

Question: What is the status of Fall River's residential solar power program?

Answer: Fall River Electric's "Cooperative Solar" program has a few remaining subscriptions available at \$150 each. This is a one-time payment that allows members to benefit from solar energy production, even if they cannot put solar on their own rooftop. Subscribing members will be guaranteed a "one-to-one" kilowatt hour exchange for the next twenty-plus years! For every kilowatt hour of solar generation, you will receive a credit for a kilowatt hour. Each month you will see that credit on your statement for the kilowatt-hours of solar power your unit(s) generate. 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Fall River Fiber-Optics Operate At The Speed Of Light

Over the past decade Fall River Electric Cooperative has been installing and expanding the use of fiber-optics, not only for our own use, but also for other regional companies.

Fiber-optics is the science of transmitting data, voice, and images by the passage of light through thin, transparent fibers. A fiber-optic cable can contain from a few fibers to hundreds within a single plastic casing. So, how is Fall River Electric using fiber?

"We have completed the installation of fiber to our offices in Driggs and West Yellowstone, to all five hydroelectric power generating facilities, and to twenty-four of our twenty-six substations for the purposes of data transmission and security," said Shannon Hill, Fall River Electric's Information Technology Manager.

Fiber provides for meter data transmis-

sion from every meter on Fall River's system through each substation to the Ashton headquarters at the speed of light. Additionally, each Fall River offices' computers can be centrally controlled. The Co-op's phone system is linked via fiber, and regional providers for fiber-to-home and wireless internet services also benefit. Fall River Electric leases "dark fiber" to four regional companies from Rexburg, Driggs, Island Park, and West Yellowstone. Those "dark fibers" are then resold to area residents and businesses for wireless internet service and fiber-to-home connections. These leases to other companies provide another incoming revenue stream for the Co-op.

As more uses for fiber come along, Fall River Electric will continue to be in the forefront of this technology.
