#### OFFICES TO BE CLOSED JULY 4TH

Fall River Electric Cooperative offices will be closed on Thursday, July 4, 2024, in observance of Independence Day. This has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the 18th century and the American Revolution. In June 1776, representatives of the thirteen colonies, then fighting in the revolutionary struggle, determined to declare their independence from Great Britain. On July 2, the Continental Congress voted in favor of independence, and two days later, on July 4, its delegates adopted the Declaration of Independence. #### \$2 MILLION IS WAITING TO BE CLAIMED

If you or someone you know are past members (customers) of Fall River Electric Cooperative, there may be a "pot" of money waiting to be claimed! Over the years, members move from Fall River Electric's service territory leaving behind unclaimed patronage capital, which is excess revenue collected above the cost of providing electric service. Because your Cooperative is a nonprofit, these funds are returned to our members.

### Legislation Filed In Congress To Reverse Dam Agreement

U.S. Congressman Dan Newhouse of Washington state has filed a package of nine bills to reverse parts of a new agreement that he sees as the de facto breaching of the lower Snake River dams (LSRD) in eastern Washington.




"I have consistently reminded the administration that the authority over the lower Snake dams remains in the hands of Congress," Newhouse said. "This package is not only a staunch reinforcement of that fact, but a testament to our commitment to protect these critical pieces of infrastructure." The package would prohibit breaching the four Snake River hydroelectric dams if certain power production replacement goals, including reliability and consumer costs, could not be met or if breaching would make the river less navigable for barging or increase the cost

of moving products on the river. It would also give the Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) authority over changes to how much water is spilled over the dams, rather than using that water to produce electricity.

The bills are co-sponsored by several representatives from Idaho, Oregon, and Montana, including Idaho Representative Russ Fulcher.

## **Teaching The Dangers Of Electricity At School**



A demonstration of how electricity can travel through a person's body, damaging organs.

Each school year, Fall River Electric Cooperative invites elementary school students to attend an electrical safety demonstration conducted by the Co-op's specially trained linemen. This year hundreds of students attended the demonstration from classes in Victor, Driggs, Alta, Ashton, Parker, St. Anthony, Rexburg, Hibbard, Ririe, and West Yellowstone. Students are taught about the dangers of electricity, downed power lines, underground and above ground lines, and electrical safety hazards around their homes. The goal is to ensure each student gains a better understanding about how to be safe around electricity and what to do in case of emergencies. They are encouraged to share the information they learn with their parents and siblings.

### **Cooperative Promotes Two Team Members**

Following the recent retirement of Brent Gamett as Operations Manager, Randy Wakefield has been promoted to the position. Wakefield was chosen from a field of 49 highly qualified candi-

# SAFFTY TIPS



- Maintain a 10-foot clearance around all utility equipment in all directions.
- Use a spotter and deployed flags to maintain safe distances from powerlines and other equipment when doing field work.
- If your equipment makes contact with an energized or downed powerline, contact your co-op immediately by phone and remain inside the vehicle until the power line is de-energized. In case of smoke or fire, exit the cab by making a solid jump out of the cab, without touching it at the same time, and hop away to safety.
- Consider equipment and cargo extensions of your vehicle. Lumber, hay, tree limbs, irrigation pipe and even bulk materials can conduct electricity, so keep them out of contact with electrical equipment.
