Co-ops Vote On November 5



If you could shape the future of your community in five steps, would you? While it might seem like an impossible question, the 2024 general elections are taking place nationwide next month, giving Fall River Electric Cooperative ownermembers—like you—the opportunity to make your voice heard on issues that affect your community. This election is an opportunity to elect candidates who support energy policies that promote safe, reliable, and affordable energy.

Fall River Electric understands the importance of voting with co-op issues in mind and is working to ensure all our members go the polls as Co-op Voters. To help, we are partnering with Co-ops Vote, a national, non-partisan initiative focused on enhancing the political strength of electric co-ops through relationshipbuilding with policymakers.

Co-ops Vote is a program built to give members of Fall River Electric the resources and information needed to vote with Fall River Electric issues in mind. So, how can you be a co-op voter at the polls? Well, it is as easy as following these five steps.

1.Get Ready: Registering to vote is simple and easy! To help, Co-ops Vote has a website full of voter resources and information. You can check it out at www.vote.coop.

- 2. Get the Details: Every state's election process is different, and it is important to know about upcoming voter registration deadlines, the process for requesting absentee ballots, and more so you do not miss key dates. We have made it easy. You can find all the information about voting in Idaho, Montana, or Wyoming by visiting www.vote.coop/gotv.
- 3.Get Informed: Before you head to the polls, it is important to be educated on the policy issues that help keep your community's power reliable, affordable, and safe. Learn more about these issues by joining Voices for Cooperative Power, a national network of co-op advocates, by visiting www.voicesforcooperativepower.com/issues.
- 4.Get the background: Now that you are registered and informed, it is time to learn about your candidates. You can view a list of your current elected officials on the Voices for Cooperative Power website and then click to view their official website for news releases and official policy positions.
- 5. Get others involved! Now that you have done your research and are officially ready to head to the polls as a Co-op Voter, it is time to get your family, friends and neighbors involved.

We encourage you to complete these five simple steps and become a #CoopVoter. America's electric cooperatives, including Fall River Electric, understand the importance of political engagement.

Together, we have the power to educate lawmakers, build awareness about our issues and concerns, and support legislative issues that are important to our communities. The co-op voice is powerful, and it starts with you!

TAKE SAFETY HOME: Travel Safely

If you are planning holiday travel this year and wondering how to travel with safety in mind, look no further than these tips:

- 1. Do not wear flashy jewelry. Leave it at home so you are not an obvious target for robbery.
- 2. Use credit or debit cards rather than large amounts of cash. Use ATMs attached to financial locations, which are less likely to be tampered with by scammers.
- 3. Know the phone number for emergency services, especially if you are traveling out of the
- 4. Use the right bag like a cross-body bag rather than a shoulder or handbag. These are much more secure from being grabbed.
- 5. Try to blend in. Dress like the locals do.
- 6. Check in with family and friends often.
- 7. Ask locals for advice. Ask for recommendations of safe neighborhoods.



- 8. Stay aware of your surroundings whether you are in a crowded place or empty street.
- 9. Trust your instincts. If you are feeling uncomfortable, most likely there is a reason.
- 10. Use reputable transportation companies. If you are using Uber or Lyft, check the vehicle info and verify their name BEFORE you get in.
